CEO's Message

In preparation to enable our seniors to age in place with their loved ones, **St Luke's ElderCare** has **grown** to expand the capacity of our services to meet their needs.

We continue to engage our partners within an inclusive and comprehensive system. Through the Regional Hospital System (RHS), we are working with our healthcare partners to provide a streamlined care process, resulting in shorter waiting time for those who require day care, day rehabilitation and nursing services at our eldercare centres.

To better enable our seniors to age gracefully, we continue to leverage on our strengths to build a strong community network through partnerships and bonds in the community, through initiatives such as the community space collaboration with Khoo Teck Puat Hospital, and intergenerational games with school partners.

We are also working with educational institutions such as ITE College East and Ngee Ann Polytechnic to provide opportunities and training for the next generation of community care providers.

We will also work towards enriching the lives of our elderly through collaborations

that promote social inclusion to create a community of care. These are reflected in the client outings, where volunteers bring our elderly to places of interest.

Aging is a continuous process, bringing new opportunities for growth. Even as we care for our elderly, we also care alongside them, empowering them to volunteer in areas which they are interested in. A group of seniors from our eldercare centre are avid singers and we tapped on this interest to bring them to a nursing home, inviting them onstage to perform a medley of songs for other seniors. We have also introduced art programmes involving batik, ceramics, comic illustration, and watercolour painting.

Innovation and technology are also key thrusts to continuous improvement of care provision. SLEC is one of the community care providers who have adopted the Gym Tonic programme to put in place intelligent machines for rehabilitation. These HUR machines are designed to keep track of an elderly's rehabilitation progress.

As part of our community outreach, the Bukit Timah ElderCare project which involves using a wireless monitoring tracking system for seniors who live alone, was piloted in August 2015.

I am proud of our achievements this year and our efforts have also been recognized in the form of external awards such as the Singapore Health Quality Service Awards.

Once again, I would like to thank our volunteers, church partners, schools, caregivers, corporate partners, grassroots partners and those whom we have worked with this past year.

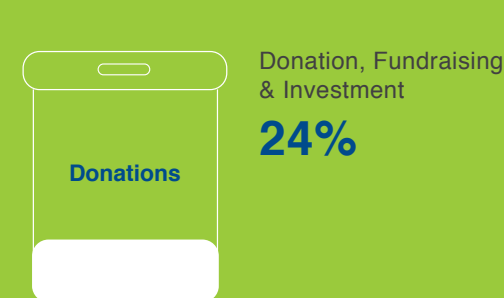

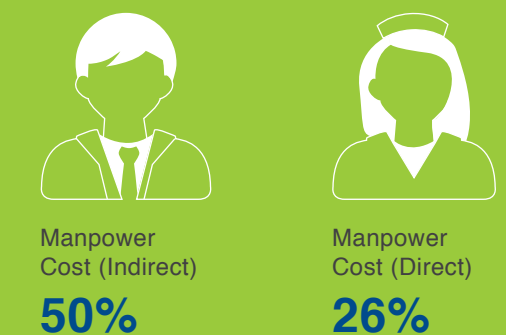
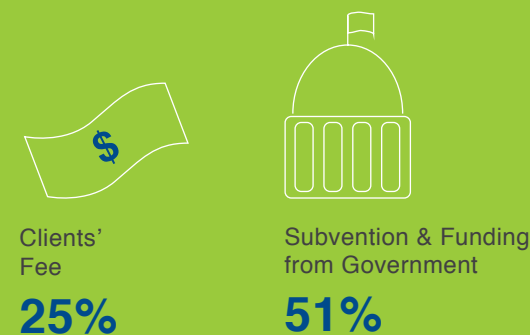

A Brother's Love Will Never End

A caregiver turned volunteer now a care staff at Telok Blangah Centre

David is a regular guy. He was previously from the food industry, manufacturing noodles that supplied hawkers in Singapore. Together with his business partner, he enjoyed his job as it gave him opportunities to meet new customers and make friends along the way.

His life changed in late November 2013 when the police visited him at home in the evening. His older brother, Jimmy, was admitted to the hospital after a stroke. Jimmy was out earlier in the day with his friends and everything seemed well. He had high blood pressure but nothing seemed out of the ordinary that day. It was a shock to David as he prepared to visit his brother in the hospital.

When he arrived, the doctor told him that his brother

had lost function on his left side. As David digested the news, he knew he had to care for Jimmy as he started on his road to recovery.

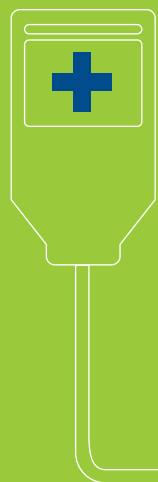
After Jimmy was discharged from the hospital, he went to St Luke's ElderCare centre at Telok Blangah in January 2015. Living near the centre, it was convenient for Jimmy to visit the centre to continue his rehabilitation. David was there with him as his caregiver every step of the way during his recovery. Having left his job to care for his brother, David decided to volunteer at the centre while his brother underwent rehabilitation.

David helped to porter patients, share tips with other caregivers on how to cope with a loved one's illness and assisted the therapists with their therapy sessions.

His friendly demeanour was a hit with the elderly clients and staff alike.

With encouragement from the therapist, David applied to become a full time staff in August 2015. Today, he is one of the many care staff at the centre, engaging clients and helping the therapists with their sessions. His duties have also expanded to ferry clients to and from the centre in the mornings and evenings.

David is glad that he is at Telok Blangah Centre. He can look out for his brother and share his experience with others who are starting their caregiving journey.

St Luke's ElderCare was set up in 1999 to meet the need for more holistic care for the elderly.

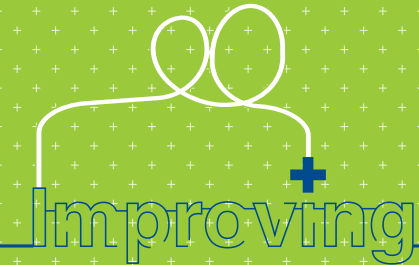
1999

St Luke's Hospital, together with churches and community organisations in Singapore, came together to set up and offer various services under St Luke's ElderCare.

This marked **the birth of St Luke's ElderCare**, and a period of sourcing for funds and preparing to set up centres.

The first office was located at Armenian Street.

Dr Lee Soo Ann became the first Chairman of St Luke's ElderCare Board of Directors



2001

Clementi, Hougang, Yishun and Whampoa, our first four centres, were officially operational.

St Luke's ElderCare HQ relocated to St Luke's Hospital.

2002

St Luke's ElderCare starts rehab services.

2003

The fifth ElderCare centre, **Tampines Centre opens**.

Our **first collaboration** with Bendemeer Sec School for Intergenerational Games begins.

The first golf fundraising activity was organized with Whampoa Centre.

The first SLEC Staff Retreat was organised.

2004

Mr Foong Daw Ching took over as Chairman of the Board.



2007

The **Active Rehab Programme** was introduced to provide customised physiotherapy treatment for elderly clients.

2008

Bukit Timah Centre begins operation.

2009

St Luke's ElderCare **took over the management of Golden Years Centre**, bringing the total number of eldercare centres to seven.



2011

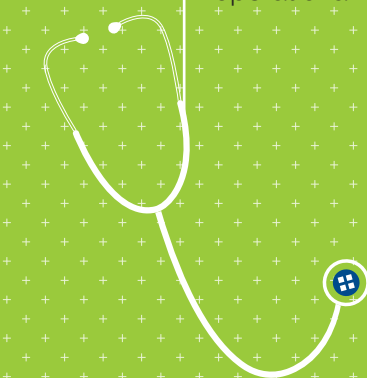
Our 9th centre, Jurong East, was officially declared open, followed by the opening of Ayer Rajah Centre and Telok Blangah Centre, bringing our total number of centres to 11.

Celebrate Christmas in Singapore (CCIS) adopted SLEC for their inaugural fundraising event, as its sole beneficiary, in conjunction with their eight year of running Christmas celebrations in Orchard Road.



2010

Serangoon Centre was officially declared operational.



2014

Ayer Rajah Centre is temporarily closed for renovation. SLEC, together with SLH, embarked on a joint visioning exercise that will guide the renewing of our Vision, Mission and Core Values.

Weekend Respite Services are rolled out at Changkat & Yishun centres.

Clementi and Tampines centres stepped up as from operating as a Day Care Centre to a Senior Care Centre in July and August respectively.



2013

Opening of our second centre that is located in Tampines – Changkat Centre.

2015

Centre-based nursing services started at Changkat, Clementi and Telok Blangah, followed by Home Care services in October.

2016

Yishun Centre relocated and began operating as Chong Pang; Nee Soon East and Nee Soon Central centres in the three respective zones.



Taking One Step At A Time

A patient who now volunteers with the chronic aphasia group therapy

When you meet Irene* for the first time, you find a young lady working on her career and enjoying life like the rest. But things changed when Irene was diagnosed with cerebellar lesion due to acute disseminated encephalomyelitis in December 2014. Acute disseminated encephalomyelitis is an immune-mediated inflammatory disorder characterised by a widespread attack of inflammation in the brain and spinal cord that damages myelin – the protective covering of nerve fibers.

She was admitted to the hospital for treatment till January 2015. After she was discharged, she became a client at St Luke's Hospital's Day Rehab Centre in February 2015.

Irene was referred for speech therapy by her occupational therapist, Charissa Tan, while she was at St Luke's. Irene was diagnosed with dysarthria, a motor speech disorder caused by impairment to the muscles involved in speech production. The disorder made her speech slurred and monotonous.

Her medical condition affected her cognitive communication abilities as well. She had difficulty maintaining eye contact with her communicative partner and had reduced communication intent. She also had difficulty in some executive functions such as planning, organisational skills and emotional control.

This led to her low self-esteem, something she wanted to overcome. With the help of her speech therapist, Siew Wei, Irene underwent weekly speech therapy sessions, and subsequently went for sessions once a month as she improved. She was trained to read text with multisyllabic words and in different intonations. There was also role-play of speaking in different scenarios to improve her social pragmatic skills. During her free time, she would write in her journal, and practise speaking, reading and writing.

Taking things one step at a time and through sheer determination, her speech has improved. Now, she only

has some difficulty pronouncing multisyllabic words and slight monotonous speech. Her communication skills have improved as well. She has better eye contact with her communicative partner and provides quicker response.

To help boost her self-esteem, Siew Wei encouraged her to register as a volunteer at St Luke's. Through volunteering, she familiarised herself with administrative tasks, preparing for her new job. It also gave her the opportunity to meet more people to practise her speech and socio-pragmatic skills.

Recently she volunteered in the chronic aphasia group therapy. She enjoys being part of the group therapy, helping people with communication difficulties. In one of her cognitive behavioural therapy session, she shared that she feels her life is more fulfilling. With ongoing therapy and volunteer work, Irene is slowly working towards boosting her self-esteem.

Strengthening Our Collaborations

St Luke's continues to work with our partners, strengthening cooperation and bonds in the community, to form new initiatives, services, academic and infrastructure collaborations.

Through initiatives that include healthcare collaborations with the restructured hospitals and other healthcare providers, St Luke's ElderCare and our partners are **making a difference** in the **communities** in which we live and work.



Collaboration with AHS

With Alexandra Health System (AHS), SLEC has collaborated on Home Medical and Home Nursing services. We have also worked on a cluster collaboration for a common space to run and co-develop programmes for the elderly in the neighbourhood.

Academic Internships, Awards and Bursaries

SLEC has also reached out to academic partners for awards collaboration for the St Luke's Book Prize. Partners include ITE College East and Ngee Ann Polytechnic.

Bukit Timah ElderCare Project

As part of community outreach, SLEC staff visited several homes in Bukit Timah to conduct Falls Risk Screenings and education on preventive exercises. This was part of the Bukit Timah ElderCare Project, which featured a wireless motion tracking system for the vulnerable elderly who lived without caregivers at home.

NKF Health Screening with Changkat Centre

With an aim to keep the community informed of their health conditions, SLEC collaborated with the National Kidney Foundation to conduct a complimentary health screening session at Changkat Centre. The session benefited approximately 50 clients who each received a detailed report of their personal health status. Similar sessions will continue to be held at the rest of SLEC centres.

Participation in Go-to-Point Dementia programme

SLEC has collaborated with AIC to build a Dementia-Friendly Community (DFC) in the neighborhood of our eldercare centres. This means that our eldercare centres are part of the network of "Go-to-Points" which serve as safe return points for "lost and found" seniors, and where arrangements will be made to reunite them safely with their family and caregivers. Go-To Points are places in the community where the general public can bring persons who look lost and are unable to find their way home.

Improving

Organisational Excellence

– New Initiatives

HEAL (Healthy Eating And Living) Programme

The programme was launched in January 2016, with the aim to increase awareness of healthy eating and living in the workplace, encourage healthier dietary practices in the workplace as well as educate staff on both physical and mental health. Staff could look forward to health screenings, dietetic sharing and outdoor activities as part of the lineup.

Home Medical Nursing Service

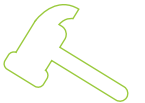
As part of efforts to continue our services in the heart of the community, St Luke's ElderCare initiated the Home Care services in October 2015. Reaching out to the elderly who are too ill to leave their homes, Home Care comprising Home Medical and Home Nursing services provides a range of services such as assessments, wound management, education and monitoring of chronic disease, bowel care, stoma care and tube changing. To date, the Home Care team has received 164 referrals for these services.

Gym Tonic



SLEC was one of the community care facilities that adopted the Gym Tonic Programme, putting in place HUR machines. Our physiotherapists have utilised these machines to develop a training programme for the elderly with the aim to improve strength and fitness levels. The programme also includes rehabilitative exercises to help the elderly who have suffered a stroke or fall.

Renovation of Clementi and Tampines Centres



To meet increasing needs of the elderly in the community, both centres underwent renovation and re-opened as senior care centres. Both centres now offer integrated services such as maintenance day care, dementia day care, day rehabilitation and centre-based nursing within their premises.

PSA Volunteer Training

As part of the PSA Health@Home program, 100 volunteers have undergone 2 training sessions that equipped them with essential skills such as safety and fall prevention techniques. They also acquired knowledge pertaining to eldercare and person-centered care. Having adopted a systematic approach, the session was broken down into a few phases that helped to facilitate flow of information, provide clarity, and promote understanding.

Art Therapy

Engagement in meaningful activities is a key component in providing care to the elderly. St Luke's Art Therapy Programme was recently introduced at our eldercare centres, as a part of ageing well, and encouraging the elderly to develop new hobbies. These span a wide range from batik and ceramic, to water colour and comic drawings. Our art therapy services may also be contextualised to reach out to clients with dementia.

Infrastructure

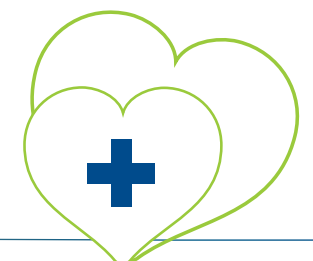
In 2015, Cloud file-sharing was implemented across Corporate HQ and our network of Centres to enhance accessibility of information. Staff are now interconnected and able to access centralised and

shared information easily, regardless of their location.

In addition, staff will be equipped with electronic devices thus enhancing their efficiency and reducing the usage of paper.

When fully implemented, time spent on ground administration will be significantly reduced, resulting in increased operational efficiency.

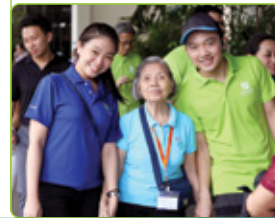

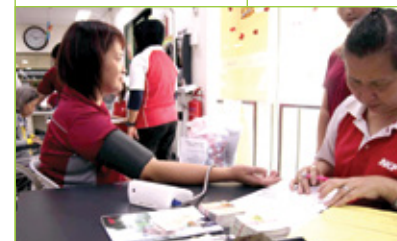

St Luke's Charity Golf 2015

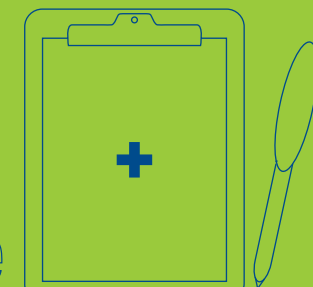

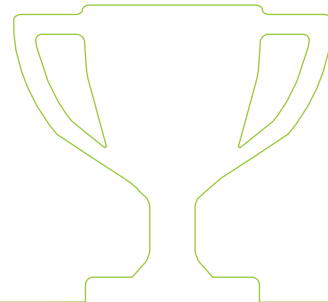

Staff Learning & Development Journey

The Singapore National Employers Federation (SNEF) and SLEC entered into a working agreement for a funding package under the Enterprise Training Support scheme (ETS).

The ETS scheme has helped to allay our training costs in raising our productivity and up-skilling our workforce to be competent in providing safe quality care to our elderly clients.

The Training & Development unit has looked into needs of the workforce and thus identified the mandatory training to include in the training plan, which includes Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR)/ AED, Basic Cardiac Life Support (BCLS), Adult First Aid (AFA), Dementia Care training, In-house Core and Elective modules, amongst other training courses.



In-House Trainers' Capabilities

To date, there are 3 managers who are certified in Advanced Certificate in Training & Assessment (ACTA). The ACTA certification allows them to conduct competency-based assessment; interpret the Singapore Workforce Skills Qualifications (WSQ) Framework; develop a competency-based assessment; design and develop a WSQ facilitated training programme; and prepare and facilitate classroom training.

This is essential to the development of our in-house training capability to design, develop and deliver our core and elective modules according to WSQ framework and getting

SLEC accredited with In-House Approved Training Organization (ATO) by the Singapore Workforce Development Agency (WDA).

In addition to our two internal full-time trainers, SLEC has 5 Centre Managers who are trained in Core and/or Elective modules. The Core module trains in the various areas of care for the elderly, including Understanding Ageing, Communicating with Older Persons, Hygiene and Infection Control and Transfer Techniques.

Looking Forward

Increasing needs within the sector will continue to guide possible expansion plans in our infrastructure and services. To broaden our capacity to serve the community, St Luke's ElderCare aims to add on to the existing number of eldercare centres. We also have plans for a dedicated training centre and innovation centre for learning and development, to achieve a culture of excellent service.

Supporting seniors who wish to remain mobile and live independently in the community will continue to be a focus for St Luke's ElderCare.

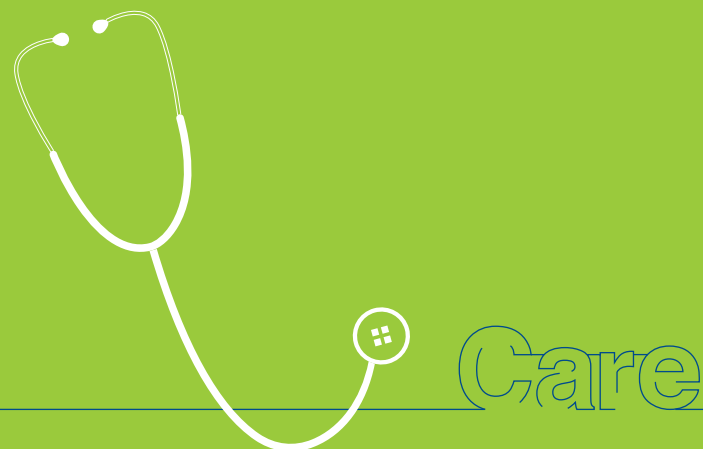
